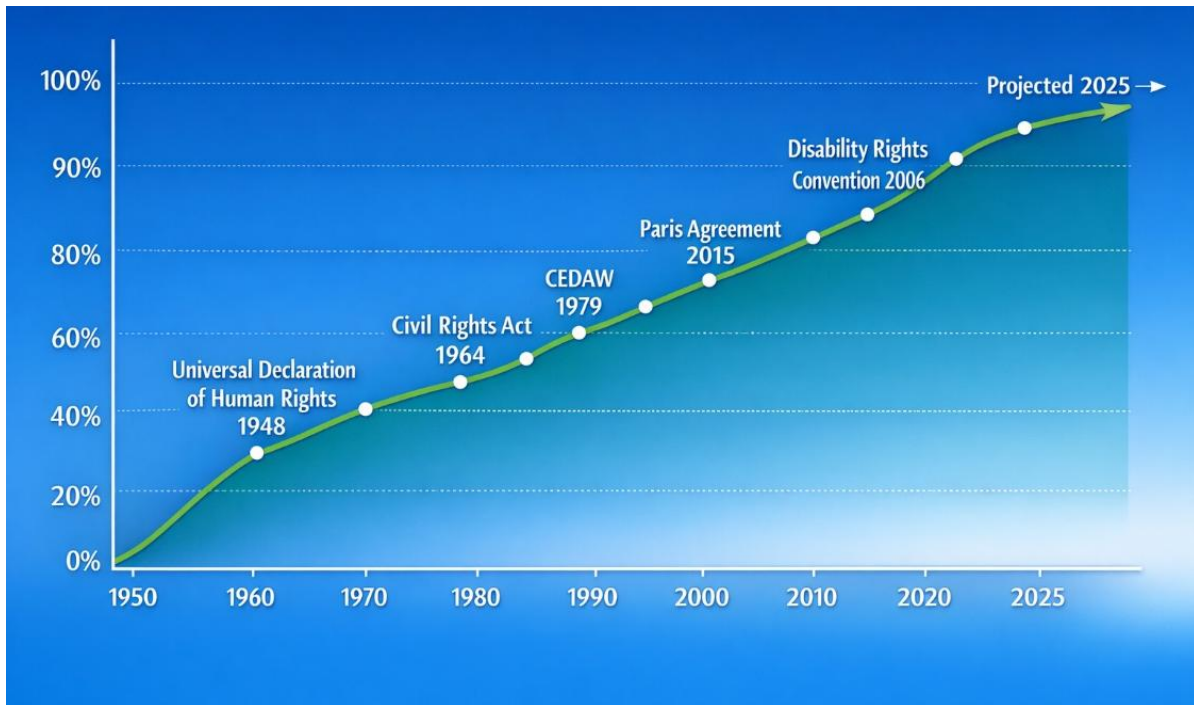


Figure 1: Global Adoption of Key Civil Rights Laws (1948-2025)
